Letter from the President

“When we recall Christmas past, we usually find that the simplest things, not the great occasions, give off the greatest glow of happiness.”
~ Bob Hope

Thinking back on the Christmases of years past, I am finding that many of my memories, once sharp and clear, are beginning to blur into a gently rolling tapestry of fuzzy images and warm feelings. I am also finding that they revolve mainly around the little things – shoveling snow after a snowstorm with my family, looking through the Sears, Penney’s and Service Merchandise catalogs for the latest toys that I would ask “Santa” to give me for Christmas, making (and eating) Christmas cookies, shopping the local malls looking for the perfect gift, and of course, Christmas morning around the tree.

I loved helping my mother make Christmas cookies, though my “help” was typically limited to pouring chocolate chips into the bowl, or licking the spoon after the mixing was done. I also enjoyed using a number of special Christmas-themed cookie cutters that we used to create cookies in the form of my favorite Peanuts characters, such as Charlie Brown, Linus, Lucy and Snoopy, as well as using cutters with more traditional Christmas themes such as Christmas trees, ornaments, and gingerbread men.

Speaking of ginger, one of my clearest memories is of our dog Ginger, who loved to snap at the snow as we shoveled and tossed it up onto the side of the driveway. Even after her face and coat were sopping wet, and her paddy little paws were full of little ice balls between her toes, she could not get enough of trying to catch the flying snow. Ginger was a Collie/Shepherd mix who showed the best attributes of both breeds, with a warm heart, a powerful shepherding instinct, and a strong sense of family. Where we would go, she would go, and there was no discussion – especially if it was to go for a walk in the field where 355 now runs.

As kids, we frequently played in that field and in the old apple orchard that once sat atop the hill. Sometimes, if we were feeling adventurous, we would head all the way out past the orchard to the creek and to the cornfields that once ran all the way up to Butterfield and Finley. The orchard was full of winding trails that were perfect for hiking and biking, and many of my most vivid childhood memories revolve around “the field” and “the orchard” that I used to walk through on the way to school. And in the wintertime, we would make that walk with our sleds, headed to the hill behind Glen Park School.

One of my best memories of Christmastime, and wintertime in general, is of sledding down the big hill behind what used to be Glen Park School (now The Fountain of Life Church, where we hold our BHOA meetings). My brother and I used to ride our Flexible Flyers all the way down to the goal posts, sometimes even farther if the snow was just right. Ginger would chase us and bark at us all the way down the hill, her powerful shepherding instinct kicking in, trying to keep us “in the herd”. When the snow was just right, dozens of families would take advantage of that hill all at once. It was one of the greatest of the “simple things”, like walking the dog through the open fields, taking the time to make Christmas cookies, and decorating the house “just right” for Christmas that for me formed the most precious memories of Christmases past.

And though some of these things are no longer available to us, at least not in “the way it used to be”, such as the orchard and the field – now buried under thousands of tons of concrete – and the Christmas catalogs – now largely replaced by mail order and the Internet – many things still persist. People still decorate their homes nicely for Christmas, and many still take the time to go through the old rituals, such shopping in the malls and local mom and pop shops, and occasionally even caroling in the street. The Spirit of Christmas, though quenched somewhat in recent years due to the concerted efforts of certain well-organized groups of grinchers, remains alive and well at the heart of what it means to be a good neighbor. And despite the best efforts of some, Christmas still exemplifies the best of what humanity has to offer, and remains a prime time for neighbors to get together to share in bonds of fellowship.

For this reason, we at the Butterfield Homeowners Association will continue to keep Christmas well every year. Our entrances will continue to be festooned with Christmas decorations, with the addition of lights this year. Also, we will be having a “Best Decorated Christmas House” contest this year, the winner of which will have a picture of their house featured in our next newsletter and on our website. 

Pledge of Allegiance

Police Report

Cpl. Mike Shehee, DuPage County Sheriff's Office, reported the following incidents occurred since his last presentation at the August 15th, 2013 meeting:

- There was an unsuccessful robbery attempt.
- Officer Shehee also handed out several informative brochures and pamphlets, including:
 - How to text anonymous crime tips to the sheriff's office
 - How to join the DuPage County Crime Stoppers program
 - A Home Security and Safety Checklist
 - How to join the Neighborhood Watch patrol

The minutes were read by Gloria Atkins and were accepted by the membership as corrected.

Report Feedback

Some members had questions regarding the budget, and related issues, as follows:

- It was requested that there be at least three bid requests put out for lawn cutting next season before a formal contract is agreed upon again.
- Go Daddy web hosting charges need to be verified.
- Carl Schroeder also needs to be compensated for expenses related to electrical repairs undertaken on the three entrance signs.
- Past Treasurer MaryAnn Devitt noted that in the Treasurer’s Report, the words “Defense Fund” needed to be added in after the two CD line items listed under “BHOA Assets”, so that the current Treasurer’s Report would remain consistent with past Treasurer’s Reports.
- Except for the changes request listed above in bullet point 4, the Treasurer’s Report was accepted as presented. The requested changes have been added in to this formal minutes document.

President Elwell, current head of the Marketing Committee, went over marketing activities undertaken since the August 15th meeting:


Website

Welcome Wagon

Sandy Henry and Jean Paprocki called on 10 homes in July, passing out 6 welcome bags to the 6 new homeowners who were home at the time of the visit. In the first half of October, they had visited four new homeowners. They have also purchased new bags at a good price from Trader Joe's, which will include free passes to Morton Arboretum from Todd Jacobson, car wash tickets from Mark Gill (BP gas station on Route 53) and other handouts.

Landscaping Committee

- President Elwell made the formal announcement that Todd Jacobson is now officially the chairman of the Landscaping Committee.
- Mr. Jacobson presented slides of the committee planting the new design at the Lloyd entrance. He also thanked Tim Larson for his work using his rototiller and new BHOA member Jessie James for her help in planting.
- Phyllis and Carl Schroeder and Norm and Gloria Atkins, members of the Landscaping Committee, will water and maintain the 22nd St. and Gray entrances, respectively.
- Todd also announced that he is going to pursue additional bids to handle next year's lawn cutting and related needs. He was also thanked for donating compost and mulch for the entrances.
- The subject of getting water to our new plantings was also raised. The committee had contacted the Butterfield Park District to see if we could use their existing water tank to save on costs, but had not yet received a reply as of the meeting date.
- A homeowner on Lloyd has volunteered to let us use their water, and in return, they have received a free membership in the BHOA for as long as they continue to donate use of their water.
- The subject of the ash trees dying due to the Emerald Ash Borer infestation was also addressed. York Township is in the process of removing the trees and has started replacing them with new saplings. Milton Township will not replace any trees, nor will they allow any homeowners to replant any trees in the parkways. Todd Jacobson would like to petition this and needs volunteers to get signatures to present to Milton Township.

No Unfinished Business

President Elwell suggested several topics of discussion for the membership to consider, as follows:

- One person noted the problem of neglected homes being eyesores in the community. It was suggested that the Fountain of Life Church be contacted to offer help to those homeowners who are unable to care for their lawns or are otherwise in need. - The suggestion was made that we start a contest for the best decorated Christmas house. The current President would be the judge of whose house was the best decorated, and that house would be the subject of an article in the newsletter and on our website, <http://mybhoa.com>. How do we improve safety and cost of living, per our survey responses?

- President Elwell noted that, when the survey results came back from our Butterfield Homeowners Survey, the two top responses for ways that the BHOA can help Butterfield be a better place to live were improving safety, and cost of living. To handle these important requests, President Elwell created a new Consumer Advocate committee, and appointed Bob Garstki to be its new chairman. President Elwell will head up the new Safety Committee himself until someone else can be found to sit as full-time chairman.
- As part of our new Consumer Advocate initiative, we will look into having CUB, Illinois American Water and other utility companies to speak at our meetings.

Should there be an Activities Committee?

- President Elwell was happy to announce that he has also appointed new BHOA member Tony Danylevsky, as our new Canopies manager, so we will no longer be discontinuing that service. We are also looking for volunteers to store our landscaping decorations.

- President Elwell also discussed the possibility of creating an Activities Committee, which would coordinate our efforts with other activities going on in Butterfield, such as garage sales, parades, and school events.

Interest in volunteering for the new Butterfield Historians Committee

- President Elwell made a request for volunteers to help with the new Butterfield Historians committee. This committee will be responsible to research and submit for publication old photos, stories, facts and figures, and any history of Butterfield East. One member in attendance noted that there is a Facebook site titled “Butterfield Memories” that also could be used as a resource.
- One member noted that the BHOA used to give an informational brochure to new homeowners in the subdivision, and that they would like to start doing that again. It was agreed that this was a good idea, and a motion was made and passed to allocate \$300.00 to reproduce and reprint the old brochure for new homeowners and members.

Should we create a flag for Butterfield?

President Elwell brought up the question as to whether or not Butterfield has a flag and, if not, should it have one? He also enquired if there was an official seal, logo, or mascot. It was determined that we will use the original “Beautiful Butterfield” logo that was created by the founders of the subdivision, as well as the flower emblem, on all formal communications. The logo and any other symbology would henceforth be handled by the Marketing Committee.

Open Forum

Near the end of each meeting we hold an open forum, where questions regarding subjects that were not covered in the formal meeting agenda can be brought forward and discussed. At this month’s meeting, the following subjects were discussed:

- Mary Ann Devitt volunteered to chair the Nominating Committee for the 2014 election. She will announce the slate of officers to be elected at the March meeting. President Doug Elwell, Vice-President Connie Poulos-Loos, and Treasurer Bob Garstki all expressed interested in running for office again in 2014.
- After an open discussion with the attending membership, upon their request, President Doug Elwell made the decision to alter the meeting schedule in order to better meet their needs. Henceforth, the BHOA meeting dates will be moved from the third Thursday of every other month to the second Thursday of every other month. Moreover, the annual monthly meeting schedule will now start in January instead of February, so that meetings will now be held in the following months: January, March, May, July, September and November.
- It was also decided to cancel the regular December meeting for 2013 and instead move the next meeting to January 2014, as very few people will be able to attend due to holiday conflicts. This was also part of the reasoning behind changing future meeting schedules to not include December. The next meeting will instead be held on January 9, 2014.

- It was suggested that membership dues paid during the months of November and December will be credited for the remainder of that fiscal year, and also extended to the end of the next fiscal year. Membership payments submitted prior to November will be credited to that fiscal year only. President Elwell agreed that this was a good idea, and so it is now official BHOA policy.
- A member asked if we could look into getting the left turn arrow, as one turns east on Butterfield Road from Lloyd, to remain on longer, as it takes 2 minutes for it to turn green again. It was suggested that he contact IDOT. President Elwell said that he would also look into it as part of the BHOA's new safety initiative, and that he would also look into a report about the light on 22nd and Finley not working properly.
- Another member reported that a meeting regarding the widening of the road at Rte. 53 and Butterfield Road, which was scheduled to be held at Glenbard South in September, never took place, and has not been rescheduled. Resurfacing would take 1-2 years after the meeting for widening in either case.
- The same member also noted a typographical error in the minutes for the August 15th, 2013 meeting. Under the heading, "Police Report", the second item, seventh word should be "Road" not "Street", as in "Canary Road".

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

Speak Out

QUESTION:

Have others in the area experienced extremely poor service by the substitute USPS postal carrier usually on Saturdays? I am referring to the individual that fills in for our regular letter carrier. On a recurring basis, I receive my neighbors' mail in my box, while my mail is nowhere to be found. When I have questioned that letter carrier if I saw him right after this has occurred, he said that it is hard to keep addresses straight when every street has the same house numbers. In my case, the misdirected mail that I receive, I believe, is done because of his transposing the numbers in his head while he is delivering the mail. For example, a house number like 178 becomes 187.

Also, Saturday mail seems to arrive later every week. It now averages coming after 6:30 PM if it gets delivered at all on that day.

If you have a similar complaint, please contact the USPS at USPS.com and file a complaint. If we continue to accept poor performance from the USPS, it will only continue to worsen. They only assign one letter carrier to cover all 850 homes in our sub-division. Is this the way to handle our postal needs in Butterfield?

RESPONSE:

The Post office is a government agency and like all other government agencies, they are inefficient. The Lombard Post Office manager was unavailable to comment on this.


QUESTION:

I noticed that the current board feels that it can make decisions on its own without the approval of its members. This involved an increase in the charge for mowing the lawns at the three signs. At the last meeting, it was indicated that the increase payment was made without a vote from the members. There also was an additional payment made to Go Daddy for \$59.88, which would be over the budgeted amount and this increase was not voted on. It would be proper if, before these payments were made, they would be presented at the meetings and had the members vote on the increase.

RESPONSE:

All three signs are on homeowner's property and the BHOA should not be paying for the mowing around the signs. The BHOA bylaws also state that any expenditure not budgeted MUST be voted on. All the members who show up for the meetings should make sure the bylaws are followed by the BHOA board.


